## At Loew's Rochester

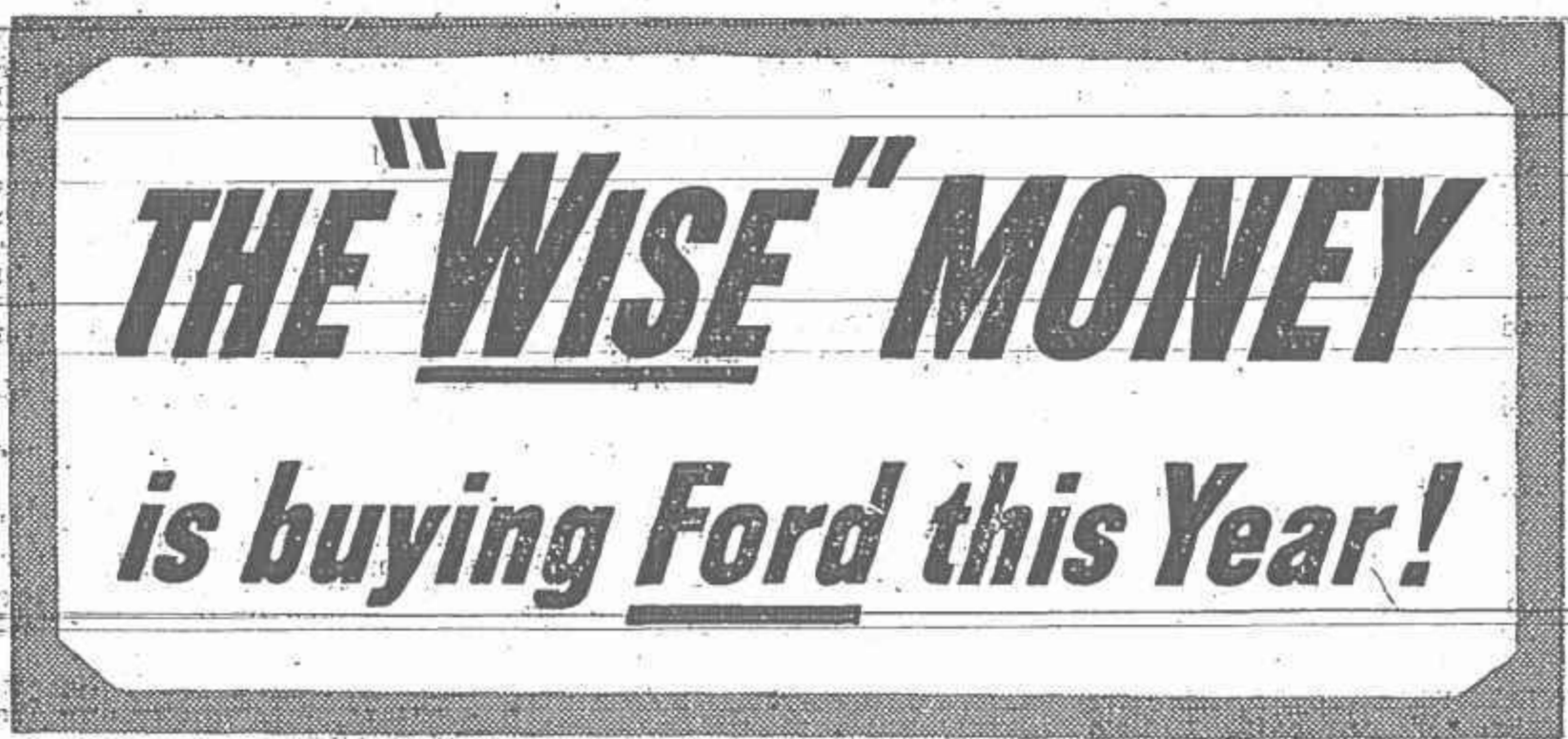

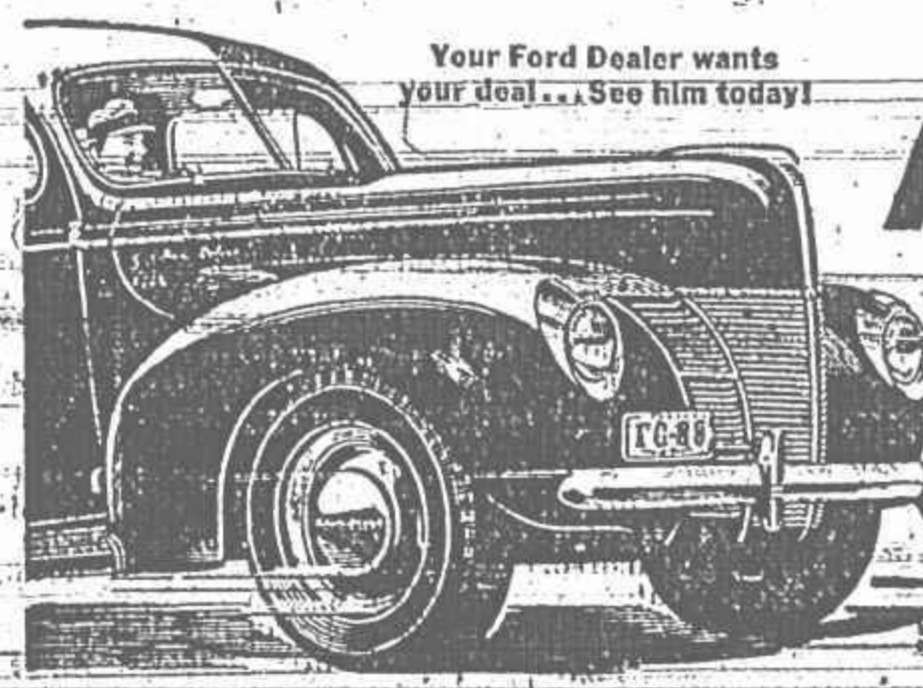
The intensive courtship which both men pay to their previously lonely wife make "Too Many Husbands" a picture in a million.
